# Exotics In Captivity

re animals better off in captivity than in the wild like their relatives? We wish every one of our enclosures was empty, but that would only be if we lived in a "perfect world". Some day we may live in a perfect world and we hope to live to see that special day. If an animal is born in the wild, it should remain in the wild unless some type of intervention is needed, an orphaned, abandoned baby or a mother killed. Intervention should take place, if at all possible, rather than see biologists stand by and do nothing but document that baby's death on the Discovery Channel. Being in the wild is beautiful and at times a cruel harsh life, but one to which adult animals are accustomed.

Being born in the wild and being born in captivity are two different things. Once born in captivity, animals are our complete responsibility. They did not have a voice or choice and humans decided who and when they would be born, either through planning or stupidity. Once an animal is born in captivity, they do not learn to fear humans from their parents nor learn necessary skills to hunt prev. They are usually made completely defenseless by being declawed, some defanged and 99% are bottle fed. They are imprinted on humans from the moment they are born.

Each year we receive many letters asking "Why can't we return those in our care back into the wild?". If you took a captive exotic and set it free it would first be terrified of the open space. Death would likely come slow through starva-

tion, a vehicle accident or poaching. Habitats diminish daily for those who reside in the wild, and in wildlife preserves, poaching is the number one cause of death. You see, these animals are worth nothing alive, but dead they are worth thousands upon thousands of dollars for their various parts. If we are to live on this planet in harmony with wildlife, they need our honor, respect and protection for their very existence. Captive animals do not fear humans or our machines, they do not question where their processed food comes from because they never ever had to kill to survive. They were born to live their days out in captivity. Many will live to see 20-30 plus years, unlike those in the wild, where most would only live to 10 or 12 years of age. We care for them, they are loved, fed and pampered.

True sanctuaries pick up the pieces of those brought into captivity. Abandoned, abused and unwanted, or the product of changing events in a former owner's life that eventually affect a beloved animal. We have seen and heard it all. Picking up the pieces and putting animals' lives back together is beyond anything one could ever describe. To have an incoming animal frightened, dangerous and unpredictable, then to be able to turn that animal around in a few short months to be loving, happy and well adjusted is such a blessing. To give an animal a second chance at life and know in your heart you did the right thing makes it all worth-

We have had big cats come in

with bones sticking out the ends of their toes from botched declawing and animals that were living skeletons from neglect and abuse. They have been restored by our veterinarians and volunteers with months of TLC. To see how happy they are now and released from years of misery gives our hearts — and yours — a huge smile. The animals are grateful for a second chance when they thought no one cared. Grateful for human friends that they were designed to love at birth but were denied those rights as well as the right to be born into the wild.

We humans have taken so very much from all the living creatures on this planet. Good sanctuaries try to make it right. The animals deserve the very best and nothing less; it is our responsibility to give that to them and we always will for as long as sanctuaries like ours need to be in existence.

# In Memory of Togar: 8/18/1984 to 2/16/2008

t is with great sadness that I report the loss of our beloved old lion,
Togar, who quietly passed away in his sleep the night of February 16th,
2008. Togar was loved by many and had a very distinct roar like none other. It is with a heavy heart as I write this because Togar was my absolute favorite lion. He was a purebred black-maned Atlas Lion, which at present are virtually extinct. The small number of Atlas lions that are

tigers. Togar could not be used because of a fractured hip he sustained when becoming tangled in fencing at a holding area where he was on display. He was a very stout and fat baby lion with a very outgoing personality. He cuddled with me each night and would suck on my thumb. When he fell asleep he would wake and root for my thumb and then fall fast asleep once more. This went on all night long, each and every night!

He was house broken and would run to the door when he needed to go outside. Togar was such a delight to raise, his energy was very sweet but yet, always so proud and full of life. He carried himself with assurance and very aware of all that was around him. We miss him more than any words I could ever bring forth on paper and my heart is heavy with sadness with

his passing.

Togar and his original mate, Simber, lived together for 19 years. During their time together we tried to introduced a lioness named Sabrina, from Arkansas, that was part of the 'Ten Pen'. They did not accept Sabrina at all. Togar and Simber were more laid back in personality and we tried for several weeks. They also had a crippled young lioness named Jundra in with them that was severely stunted by her previous owner. Simber loved little Jundra and treated her like her own cub. One day there was a disagreement between Jundra and Sabrina. It was very interesting to watch Togar and Simber place themselves in front of little Jundra to protect her and fend off Sabrina. We took Sabrina out of the enclosure that afternoon and placed her alone. She had mental issues that would not allow her to be placed with another lion.

A few years before Simber's passing, Togar needed surgery for a blocked bowel. He had a mega colon and had suffered with it for years. It took Dr. Rudawski over five hours to relieve Togar's blocked bowel and we didn't know for more than three weeks if he was going to survive. Simber on the other hand didn't pine or hover over Togar trying to make him feel better. Instead she paid more interest in the three brothers, living in the enclosure across the aisle, letting them know she was "available" by doing her best Mae West impression! Togar did recover after many weeks of TLC from us and around the 3 week mark we woke to Togar's beautiful roars in the middle of the night and knew he was going to be all right. He had to have chicken livers each week the remainder of his life to keep his bowels moving properly.

A few years later Simber needed emergency surgery when she had a hot pyo (an infection in her uterus). The surgery went very well and was uneventful, however she had to recover away from Togar. Togar lay as close to the fence by Simber as he possibly could and would not leave her side. When we went in to give her antibiotics or change her bedding and dressings, he would call to her in a worried voice and pace until we left her alone. When we were able to reunite them, Togar fawned over her and was so happy to be back with his mate.

Simber died of kidney failure during the winter of 2002. Her final days were spent under blankets in our dining room in an effort to save our beloved lioness but it was not meant to be. Simber was 19 years old when she passed from this world and to honor her passing we took her body to Togar so he would understand why she was not coming back. Togar frantically pawed from the other side (Continued on page 5)



left in the world primarily reside in captivity and few if any can be found in the wild.

Togar's original family of seventeen pride members were harvested for their skins by a man in Neshkora, Wisconsin. He was on probation for poaching 200 black bears from the wild back in the 80's for skins and gall bladders.

Unfortunately, when exotics are born into captivity, lions, tigers, bears etc.. you can do whatever you want with them regardless if they are an endangered species or not. They are considered endangered only in the wild not in captivity.

Togar had been at the Sanctuary since he was four months old. He came from an exhibit that traveled the country, where you could get your picture taken with baby lions and

of the fence and cried loudly for his beloved Simber. He then laid down and quietly observed her lifeless body, softly calling for her with a sad soulful voice. He looked at us with searching eyes asking us to bring his beloved Simber back.

Togar wasn't the same after Simber's passing and we immediately paired him with Showka, a lioness who came in with the ten pen boys on a seizure from Arkansas. She was an elderly lioness that was ousted by her daughters, due to old age, and had been living alone for a few years. Showka and Togar lived together for two years until Showka died in 2004 from old age issues.

Kali, Togar's last mate, was from Florida and was a perfect match for Togar. She reminded us of Simber and has that special kindness about her. Kali kept Togar on his toes and has a tail fetish. How she loved the tuft on the end of his tail and would spend hours trying to catch it and have fun at Togar's expense. They curled up with each other, groomed one another and as Togar's body started to fail would bring him his dinner.

Kali has taken Togar's passing in stride and accepted his death immediately. We will attempt to pair her with Samson as soon as the weather permits, as they both now live alone. We will divide Kali"s enclosure to allow them to get used to one another.

We tried to pair Samson with the girls next to the ten pen but they are too aggressive for him and he has been living a lonely bachelor life waiting for the right lady. He and Kali's personality should mesh nicely and both are still young with many healthy years ahead of them.

After Togars passing, I heard both his and Simber's roars for several nights in a row. I

No boundaries, no borders, all one, two and four legged, connected and all live as one within our majestic universe.
