

It came in at the perfect time of the year as we can receive as many as 45 deer each day from deer vendors and deer hunters.

More Updates

The volunteers have been working hard on winterizing enclosures and houses for the animals. Many have new leak-proof roofs and dens redone to prevent drafts. This was especially important to do for our senior residents; cold and old bones make winters twice as harsh for those that have problems regulating body heat due to old age. Large pool tarps have been put up for wind breaks and a lot of banking hay has been placed along houses and fronts to keep animals warm and protected. These projects have been ongoing all fall and should be completed by December 1st, just in time for the winter snows. If you have a free Saturday or Sunday and would like to volunteer a few hours or a day, we are always in need of help the whole year round.







haman, Kachina and Rogue are three wolf hybrids. They are housed next to Jet and Bullet. These three are not people friendly

but will take treats at feeding time most days. Kachina is the favorite among members as she looks like she has a splash of

coyote in her with a very pretty profile. We received a call from a humane society in Northern Wisconsin approximately ten years ago about animals that had been starved and abandoned. We immediately headed north with the truck and trailer loaded with crates and tranquilizing equipment, not knowing what was awaiting us at the other end. When we arrived, the property was

surrounded by the local Sheriff's department. There had been a shooting by the owner's brother in the woods adjacent to the property and

the Sheriff was concerned for our safety as animals were being removed. The wolf hybrids lived in horrific conditions and it was impossible to even tell what color they were. Their kennels were six by six feet and had not been cleaned in months, possibly years. They were sliding in feces in the tiny enclosures and it was beyond disgusting. Jim tranquilized each one and a team then bathed them five or six times and still could not tell what color they were because their coats were so heavily stained and soiled. They were then checked over with a fine tooth comb, blood drawn, claws that had not been trimmed in years. trimmed and filed, vaccinated and wormed by a local veterinarian. They were then loaded in our crates for the trip home. The three were very happy to be rescued from their brutal environment and settled in right away at the Sanctuary. The owner was prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law but received a reduced sentence which didn't amount to much. She was operating a puppy mill and the conditions in her house were the same that the wolf hybrids endured outside. This was an adventure of emotional magnitude and every day we give many thanks for having room at the Sanctuary to be able to rescue these beautiful creatures.

Sadly, we turn away many wolf hybrids and other exotics because we have no room. One day we hope to relocate to a bigger and better facility with an animal disaster center in the center of it for animals that have no place to go in times of crisis in Wisconsin as well as other states. Had one been in place for the hurricane victims last year, exotics would not have had to remain in their destroyed element with unsafe make-shift repairs and at the mercy of people not knowing nutritional requirements or emotional needs. It breaks our hearts when we are unable to save a life due to lack of space and we pray our dream for a new Sanctuary is but a breath away.

Nadia

Nadia was found running loose and very thin in the northernmost part of our county. She had a rope tied around her neck and was dumped by her previous owner in the forest preserve. It took several days for local humane officers to capture her. Cindy Wrobel, our local Animal Control Officer from Lake Land Animal Humane Society,

brought her to us. If we did not have room for her, she more than likely would have been euthanized, as there are few safe havens where any of these animals can go. Good sanctuaries are full to bursting and many others are closing doors due to lack of funding and not enough volunteers. Nadia was paired with Balta about a year go and the two are very bonded. Nadia is an exquisite black and silver color and a high percentage hybrid. She is very shy around strangers and loves and trusts only a handful of volunteers. Her favorite pasttime is digging big holes and more big holes. As soon as one is filled and graveled she's starting on another den hole. Wolf and wolf hybrids have to have a heavy chain link floor system around the bot-

tom of their enclosure at least three feet in because of constant digging. We leave the middle open so they can try to dig to China if they choose. It is an important behavior pattern just like the big cats

needing to pluck fur or feathers off their food. It is all about meeting the emotional needs of each and every animal in our care.

Nadia

Balta

Balta is from the suburbs of Chicago. He was raised by a family in a busy subdivision, hidden most of his life and raised with a family dog. Balta escaped one day through an open gate when he was about a vear old. One of the neighbors tried to catch him but was bit and the would-be rescuer then called animal control and reported the incident. Balta soon ended up behind bars after being confiscated by Animal Welfare League of Chicago. In the State of Illinois, Wolf Hybrids are illegal and unfortunately many are euthanized by Humane Societies who are ill equipped to handle or house them. They can not be put up for adoption or be near the general public who have little knowledge of their behavior. It would not be safe for animal or human. Sadly, in most cases, euthanasia is the only option available. The Animal Welfare

> League of Chicago donated a big beautiful enclosure for Balta which is now shared with Nadia and opens into Nadia's old area so they have twice the space. Both hybrids are extremely well bonded and are always busy rough-housing with Nadia winning the

games they play most of the time. Baltia pampers Nadia by bringing her food, lying side by side with lots of licks and cuddles. Their connection is that of a once in a lifetime love for each other.
